### Visiting actress tells story of activist Emma Goldman at OSU-N

A longtime actor and dancer in New York City, Lable had written several plays about her life experiences when a colleague recommended she find out more about Goldman.

As she read biographies and Goldman's autobiography, she realized how different Goldman was from most women of her time.

"She refused to be 'the little woman," Goldman said. "She wanted to change the world."

In 2010, Lable received a commission from the East Lynne Theater Company to tell Goldman's story. She focused on her life from when she came to New York City to when she was deported in 1919.

"Writing for Emma Goldman was the first time I wrote about something I didn't live and I had a blast," Lable said. "I believe in everything that she said, that she worked for and that she fought for."

To portray Goldman, Lable used her extensive research to bring her words, emotions and movements to life.

She'll share some of her methods with students when she arrives at OSU-N on Friday.

On campus, she'll teach several acting classes focused on character movement.

"Acting doesn't need to have words, it has to come from the inside," Lable said. "I'm going to teach them how to use that information to enhance their scene."

Lable will be working with students until Feb. 28. But her performance of "Emma Goldman: My Life" is open to to the public.

She said she hopes audience members will ask questions about Goldman, then go home and learn more about her.

"She was a wonderful woman who believed in rights in the workers, womens rights and that women have control of their bodies," she said. "That, to me, is the crux of who she was."

# Lorna Lable, Visiting Artist, performs one-woman show

Actress Lorna Lable attracted an overflow crowd to the Black Box Theater of The Ohio State Newark campus last month for a performance of "Emma Goldman: My Life," a play she wrote to bring to life the early 20th century revolutionary. The play is set at Ellis Island as Emma Goldman, age 50 and about to be deported for her work as a social and labor reformer, responds to reporter's questions.

More than 75 students, faculty and community members filled the seats and lined the floor for the performance.

"I had never heard of Emma Goldman, but she was a woman worth knowing about. Ms. Lable did a superb job portraying her," said Margaret Wolford, a Newark resident.

Laura Younger, who teaches English at the campus described the one-woman show as "spirited and inspirational."

Born to Jewish parents in Russia in 1869, Goldman emigrated to the United States at age 17, initially working as a seamstress in a factory with her sister. Enraged by the terrible working conditions and other injustices, Goldman joined the newly formed Anarchism movement, and soon was giving talks around the nation, publishing her own paper, and writing books advocating for the rights of the disempowered. She championed free speech, birth control, women's equality, immigrant rights, and labor unions. An anti-

war activist, she was arrested, jailed and deported to the Soviet Union in 1919 on charges of interfering with the draft. "She fought for the rights of workers and for women to control their own bodies," said Lable, who was commissioned to write the play in 2010 by the East Lynne Theatre Company in Cape May, N.J. Before beginning research, she knew little about Emma Goldman, but what she found inspired her: "She wanted to change the world."

A Newark resident in attendance said she had studied Emma Goldman in a college class in the 1970s and remembered her story well. "Lorna captured the true essence of Emma. I wish there were a million Emmas in this world--such bravery."

Alcira Duenas, a history professor at Ohio State Newark, appreciated

the insight the play gave into an important historical figure, as well the opportunity it gave students to "learn important things while having fun."

Lable, resident artist at Ohio State Newark in February, also taught an acting classes and a workshop on how to portray

character through body language and expression. "You don't have to say a word to act," she told students.

In the peer mentoring class, Ohio State Newark students are trained in ADHD coaching methodology to help their peers (not necessarily diagnosed with ADHD) discover solutions to their academic problems, particularly those involving initiation and organization. They received 12 hours in ADHD coaching training from Jodi Sleeper-Triplett, one of the nation's best known ADHD coaches.

"We created a hybrid using coaching methods combined with traditional mentoring," said Cope. "Mentors in the program are not focused on course content, but in helping mentees find their own solutions and follow through. That's hard to do typically if you have ADHD, and even harder if you've gotten discouraged after years of struggling in school."


"It's important that these students are empowered to choose their own goals and strategies," said Cope. "They know themselves best. The coach just helps keep them on track, encourages them to brainstorm, or offers suggestions for resources."

Cope said that it can make a big difference: "One student who failed all his classes last semester is earning all A's this semester," she said.

"In the peer mentoring program, we are helping each other change our habits of thought," said Laura Younger, Ph.D., a lecturer in the English department, who is participating in the peer mentoring program.

Cope said that she expects the programs to grow. "We anticipate that the first year will serve as a pilot for both programs; the second year will provide refinements to the program based on feedback from participants and organizations; and the third year the programs would be established and predictable elements of our curriculum and co-curriculum," Cope said.

# 'Emma Goldman: My Life' writer superb

CAPE MAY - When East Lynne Theater Company artistic director Gayle Stalhuth commissioned New York actress Lorna Lable to write and perform "Emma Goldman: My Life," it was one of Stalhuth's wisest decisions ever.

Lable switched some time ago from her highly successful career as a professional dancer to an equally successful acting career. It was a propitious move and, with Stalhuth as catalyst, Lable added writing to her resume. Her acting career has included roles in films like "The Wiz" and "Keeping the Faith" with Ben Stiller and Jenna Elfman. Like Goldman, Lable is a bit of a maverick. She wears nobody's brand.

Lable's arduous research for the role of Emma Goldman led to the discovery that Goldman was an ardent dancer as well as agitator. That sold the charming Lable on the whole idea. She said that prior to her research she knew precious little about her subject but the research intrigued her. Lable learned that in addition to Goldman's love of dancing, she fought for the poor and unemployed, for women's rights and birth control, and much else that is relevant. Goldman was portrayed by Maureen Stapleton in the 1981 film, "Reds," star-Warren Beatty. Stapleton earned the supporting actress Oscar, and I believe Lable deserves an award for her portrayal as well.

Unfortunately, Emma Goldman is not well remembered these days, but Lable blouse, tie and long hobble skirt, the epitome of a late 19<sup>th</sup> century woman. Goldman was born in prerevolution Russia and came to the United States as a

brings her vividly back to life. According to Lable, Goldman was no great beauty but had more than her share of lovers. She didn't want to be a conventional wife and didn't want children, but was passionate about all things. Lable made her appearance as Goldman sitting alone on an antique chair in a middy-

child

After introducing herself as Goldman, Lable's first utterances were ones of defiance. She talked about the high and low points of her life while gracefully dancing about the stage. She tells her tales with great belly laugh humor. Comic/tragic episodes, like her lover's unsuccessful

attempts to make a bomb, and equally unsuccessful plan B which entailed a gun, elicited gales of laughter from the audience. Even though they were attempted assassinations, they had their funny aspects too.

Lable made it plain that Goldman seriously hated union busters and corporations, and Lable brings a large measure of passion to her portrayal and yet manages to make the audience see the funny side of it all. Goldman's failed attempt to become a prostitute is hilarious in Lable's hands.

Goldman was repeatedly incarcerated for her activities and views. She, like singer/actor Paul Robeson (to be played by Derrick McQueen later this season) was at first an admirer of the U.S.S.R., but later became disillusioned.

Lable ends the play sitting in a chair at Ellis Island awaiting deportation. It's a stunning moment, and the audience gave Lable a standing ovation.

"Emma Goldman: My Life" can be seen at First Presbyterian Church at 500 Hughes Street in Cape May Wednesday through Saturday until July 10. # The Story Of One Very Special Woman

"Emma Goldman: My Life" is reviewed by Tom Sims

OU'RE witnessing one of the greatest activists in history answer questions from phantom colleagues sitting next to you. She is a masterful speaker, answering questions with authority and ease. She's passionate, insightful and, from her answers, you soon realize she is eternally pulling for those who are lacking an advocate. And that's what you learn to love about her.

She is Emma Goldman and she is captured wonderfully in the world premiere one-person play *Emma Goldman: My Life,* playing through July 10 at East Lynne Theater. The play takes us from Emma's beginnings in the late 1800s, through a variety of love interests, to her start as an early campaigner for worker and women's rights. We watch as she first arrives in the US ("We are all foreigners in this county"), moves from Rochester to New York City, where she falls for the city then for a fellow activist.

Emma Goldman's life was filled with glory, as she rose to prominence as a public speaker and activist, to tribulation, as she experienced her lover's imprisonment and

then her own. She had her challenges with love as well and says "I could not submit to a love who insists that I must change." But she did submit to the beauty of her world, insisting, "What is the point of a revolution if you don't stop to smell the roses."

The play is performed by Lorna Lable, who is also the playwright. Lable is an accomplished actor for stage, TV, and film. She effortlessly draws you into the life of this remarkable

woman, and her words (much like that of the woman she portrays) are "passion-covered." She delivers a performance that always keeps pace, always keeps in character. Karen Case Cook, the show's director, is no doubt a major influence in ensuring that the performance is as intimate as it is informative. And the set was subtle, just enough to ensure that you're brought into Emma's world and are not distracted from this engaging life story.

I'm always impressed that East Lynne Theater productions run education and entertainment side by side. Their shows consistently enlighten and amuse — a rare combination that results in an uplifting experience. Artistic Director Gayle Stahlhuth commissioned this play and is dedicated to revealing to us great figures who are often marginalized by history. As you plan your summer theater plans, don't miss *Emma Goldman*.
